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GLEN ANDREAZZA

Glen Andreazza has grown rice in Willbriggie for almost 30 years, firstly with his parents as part of a family operation, and now with his wife Julie and their four children.

Glen is passionate about and committed to rice growing and SunRice. His vision is to see the industry profitable going forward, while continuing to grow the cleanest and greenest rice in the world.

Recognising and supporting young rice growers and shareholders to maintain a sustainable and progressive industry that is competitive on the world market, is another key focus area for him.

Glen holds an Advanced Diploma of Agriculture and is an active member of the MIA rice growing community. He has been the Chairman of the Mirrool Branch of the RGA for the past three years, a delegate to the RGA Central Executive for eight years, and has provided input and guidance via a range of other committees, including:

- Five years on the RGA Farm Business and Economics Committee, including three as Chairman;
- Three year terms on the RGA's Public Relations Committee and Climate Task Force, and a further four years as a Member of the RGA Organisation Committee;
- Four years as the Mirrool Branch RGA Secretary;
- Two years as a Member of the Irrigation Research and Extension Committee (IREC) Executive, and three as a member of the IREC Cropping Systems Sub Committee;

JULIAN MENEGAZZO

My parents immigrated to Australia in the 1930's with the work ethic, "...work 7 days a week...". This was instilled to my 3 brothers and I. As a father I passed this on to my children, but I'm struggling with the grandchildren - I spoil them rotten!

I graduated from Monash University in 1970 as a Biochemist, lasting a year working in a laboratory. Since then I have been involved in Agriculture:

Potato industry - Marketing

- Growing

Grain industry - Growing wheat, barley, canola

- Director for VicGrain and GrainCorp

Rice industry - Grower

- Investor

Connie and I live in Werribee and have farming interests here, Balliang and Narrandera.

SunRice is a magnificent food company that serves growers well. As a Director I would focus on continuing debt reduction and increasing shareholder value. In the accounts to 30 April 2011, SunRice's net debt was \$272 million down from \$307 million in 2010. This reduction signifies SunRice can manage debt over time. However, shareholder value as expressed by the NSX share price puts the company in jeopardy. Because the share price is so low, SunRice is vulnerable to a takeover. As I see it, the solution is an open listing on the Australian Stock Exchange, giving opportunity for true market value. This would necessitate simplifying the dual share (A and B) structure to one type of share only (B). Growers could retain grower control by retaining their B class shares.

I believe to strengthen and protect the company we must strengthen shareholder value.

PETER MICHAEL O'CONNOR

After purchasing a farm at Coleambally in 1983 my family has been a strong supporter of the rice industry ever since delivering our first crop in 1984. Since then we have expanded our farming operation and now run a 770 ha irrigation farming business.

I strongly believe SunRice should remain an Australian owned business that is controlled by its active grower shareholders.

The SunRice business allows us to control our own destiny. Its marketing structure offers many benefits to rice growers. To have this delivered requires a focus on efficiency and having a dedicated staff who strive to deliver the best outcomes. It also means taking advantage of business opportunities that would benefit SunRice. Having said that, the issue of debt reduction should take precedence over expansion as I see the immediate future as a time for consolidation after a lengthy drought.

The level of debt (\$300m) has been clearly identified by the SunRice Board as something that needs to be addressed. There is a need for shareholder funds to reduce this debt. Any mechanisms put in place by the SunRice Board need to be "attractive" to ensure the funds are received at the level required and in the desired timeframe. With support from both growers and shareholders the current debt situation is manageable.

Should another business offer to buy SunRice in the future and the Board ask shareholders to vote on any prospective sale, I will insist that all costs associated with the sale offer be paid by the organisation that wants to buy SunRice and that information presented to shareholders be balanced with a clear understanding of what will happen for either outcome.

MARK ROBERTSON

Mark is a second generation rice farmer from the Berriquin district, farming in partnership with his wife Margot also involving their six children.

As a Director of the SunRice board for 15 years and in the role of Deputy Chairman for last 10 years, I believe that my knowledge of our domestic and global business is integral to the success of this great company. We have encountered production highs from 1,700,000 tonnes (2001) to lows of 19,000 tonnes (2008) in the last 15 years. This has demanded a high degree of flexibility and ingenuity on our behalf. Change has been ongoing and will continue.

In this current term I have been Chairman of Trukai Industries (PNG), a Director on SolRice (Solomon Islands) and SunFoods (USA). I am also a member of the Finance & Audit, Remuneration and Due Diligence Committees and have been an active and strategic member of the Board. I am proud of my involvement.

This election brings to the forefront what I see to be the most critical issues:-

- Capital—The need to reduce our gearing in a fair and equitable way recognising current and future shareholders. The Ebro proposal definitely brought a stronger understanding of the business and the greater interest shown by shareholders is most welcome.
- Structure—The A and B Class structure has served the industry well focusing on grower control and shareholder investment. It must be remembered a large percentage of growers hold both A and B Class shares. This serves the dual purpose of recognising both the paddy supplier and investor in the industry.
- The Board—We need a cohesive and constructive Board to focus on retaining a financially strong and successful SunRice. Currently, we are clawing back market share and with a potentially larger crop in 2012, the need for a sustainable price to growers is paramount. The support by shareholders of myself and the Board during the Ebro proposal was much appreciated as this was a demanding time for the industry. The RGA has been a great sounding board for promoting directorships onto the SunRice Board in the past and must not be underestimated in the current election. Succession in younger directors will also be an advantage longer term to continue to build on the past strengths.

SunRice has been a family business which is now moving into the next generation and as a current Director of the company, I have the resolution and understanding to build on its past achievements to make sure the next step is positive. Having met and communicated with many shareholders in my time on the Board, I feel I am in tune with the most critical issues facing us today and would like the opportunity to be part of the ongoing change of our great industry.

DICK THOMPSON

Dick Thompson and his wife Jan have been growing rice at Hanwood for 40 years.

Dick is currently the Chairman of Southern Agventure, but is best known for his 12 years as Chairman of Murrumbidgee Irrigation.

Dick comes from a strong finance background, having held accountancy and management positions from 1962 – 71, prior to his career in rice farming. He was Accounts Clerk for Grazcos, Cost Accountant for Grasslands Pty Ltd, Branch Accountant for Waugh & Josephson Pty Ltd, and Riverina Area Manager for Allen Brothers Asphalting Pty Ltd.

He also held roles with the RGA, including on the Central Executive and the Economic Sub-Committee.

Dick joined Murrumbidgee Irrigation in an advisory role in 1989, and later became the inaugural Chairman of MI Limited, when the government department became a grower-controlled company. This included financial negotiations relating to the handover from the State Government, and setting up the company's constitution and structure.

During that time, he was an effective campaigner for the irrigation and rice industries at community and government levels.

Dick has further strengthened his experience with grower-based companies as inaugural Chairman of Southern Agventure since 2009.

He is also a Member of the Australian Institute of Company Directors. Dick holds further positions on the Murray-Darling Basin Community Committee and the Murrumbidgee Catchment Management Authority, and is the former Treasurer of the NSW Irrigators' Council.

If elected, Dick hopes to make a positive contribution to the SunRice Board through his knowledge of the rice, water and finance sectors. He feels experience and new ideas are important for the Board at this time, as it guides the company through a critical period.

ALAN WALSH

Alan Walsh is a rice grower in the Deniliquin and Coleambally districts, operating a mixed farming enterprise that has delivered rice every year for the last 35 years.

Alan has been a Director of SunRice for the last 10 years, a Director of Riviana Foods Pty Ltd, Rice Research Australia Pty Ltd, Member RIRDC (Rice Research and Development Committee), Rice Industry Co-ordination Committee, Delegate and Chairman of IREC (Irrigation Research Extension Committee), Central Executive Delegate to Ricegrowers Association, Secretary RGA Deniliquin Branch.

Alan is a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

Alan sees the viability of our farming enterprise, water reform and the impending Carbon Tax as critical challenges facing SunRice into the future. The Board needs to continue to investigate the best structure for SunRice going forward to secure and grow our capital base.
